head of the 70th anniversary of the victory of World War II in 2015, China decided to set two new national days that will *mark the victory of the anti-Japanese war and commemorate the victims of the Nanjing Massacre*. September 3rd is designated as the "Victory Day" of the Chinese People's War of Resistance against Japanese Aggression (1937-45), with December 13 set as "National Memorial Day for the Nanjing Massacre Victims".

China's decision to establish these two national memorial days serves as a reminder of the painful lessons of history and a warning to recent threats of right-wing Japanese politicians.
